Welcome, Wumindjika & G'day

Did you know that Sunday 27th July is National Tree Day? No? Well read on. Planet Ark's National Tree Day started in 1996 and has grown into Australia's largest community tree planting and nature care event.

It's a call to action for all Australians to get their hands dirty and give back to the community.

While every day can be Tree Day, the dedicated celebration of Schools Tree Day and National Tree Day has been held on the last Friday and Sunday in July for the last 30 years! Why not plant a tree or several this weekend? Here are a few excellent ideas as to why...

- Trees act as the lungs of the planet through photosynthesis the conversion of carbon dioxide to oxygen. In fact, it's estimated that Australian forests store 22 billion tonnes of carbon within their trunks, roots and the surrounding soil. Just four trees can store the equivalent carbon as a car produces in an entire year.
- As well as producing the oxygen we breathe, trees also help to purify our air by removing fine particles and pollutants.
- Ever wonder why the air can get so misty over forests? Trees form an important part of the weather cycle. It's estimated that 40% of rainfall over land happens because of water vapour that is released back into the atmosphere by trees.
- As they grow, trees also drive their roots deep into the ground, helping to stabilise the dirt around them, stopping soil erosion and reducing the impacts of landslides and flooding.
- As well as providing us with shelter and shade and growing many of the foods and medicines we need to live, trees have also been found to purify our water and protect us from heat and infectious diseases.
- They are also proven to be good for our mental health. Spending time among trees and nature has been proven to help boost our mood and reduce depression and anxiety.
- Many of our iconic animals, like koalas, possums, fruit bats and birds, eat different parts of trees as part of their diets. They also use trees and forests for shelter by building their homes in branches and tree hollows.
- It's estimated that over 700 threatened animal species across Australia depend in some way on forests.

ENCOURAGING POLLINATORS ON YOUR PROPERTY - Part #3

Reduce Chemical Use

Insecticides, fungicides and herbicides all affect the health of bees, bee colonies and native pollinators. Herbicides can impact pollinators by reducing the availability and diversity of flora and removing vegetation that helps support insect life. Some herbicides can also harm the beneficial microbes in the insect gut. In many circumstances beneficial insects will, in healthy numbers, help control pest insects - ultimately reducing the need for insecticide use.

When chemical pest control is unavoidable, select products that are least harmful for pollinators and apply insecticides in the evening or at night when pollinators are not active.

Always use according to directions, especially for withholding periods and notify beekeepers a few days before spraying chemicals so that beehives can be safely relocated away from harm.

Safeguard the BEES!

The best way to "save the bees' and protect our pollinators is to create an abundance of diverse habitat - from the ground up! There is much interest in keeping a beehive to promote pollinators, but there are serious legal and biosecurity responsibilities that must be considered, and that the introduction of a beehive does not displace existing native pollinators and insects. Be a friend of pollinators and say it with flowers!

Farm Plastic Waste Recycling - a LEAP forward for Sustainability


Tonnes of plastic farm waste is being turned into new products with the development of recycling techniques by the agricultural industry and engineering researchers. Each year, Australian farms go through an estimated 110,000 tonnes of plastic waste, but recycling options for soft plastics and twine in particular are limited.

Key players in Australia's grain industry unveiled a plan earlier this year to stop 45,000 tonnes of agricultural bags from going to landfill or being illegally incinerated. Researchers at a regional Victorian university have also helped to develop a machine to melt down synthetic hay binding twine and repurpose it into building products and furniture.

An industry-led, not-for-profit program to collect and recycle plastic agricultural bags is underway in Victoria with plans to expand it in the coming years. The bagMUSTER scheme is similar to the program used for chemical drums, allowing farmers to return their used soft plastic bags to stores for recycling.

CropLife Australia chief executive Matthew Cossey helped develop the program and said the bags used for fertilisers, seeds, grain, stock feed, and pet food are turned into new agricultural products. "It's a huge leap forward for farm recycling," he said, "when a farmer buys a product in the bagMUSTER program, they'll be able to return it to the retailer, and then it will be collected and fully recycled. It's as simple as that. It's critical for farming sustainability, for protecting our environment, improving recycling and it absolutely makes economic sense."

Get ready for Landcare Week 2025!




