Flying Ant Day - Did you notice it?

Each autumn, there comes a moment when we suddenly notice that the ground is crawling with large-winged ants.

Then the air seems to be full of them and we find ourselves ducking and diving, trying not to get them in our mouths or hair when riding the farm motorbike or push bike.

So, what causes this simultaneous taking to the air, and is there really such a thing as Flying Ant Day?

This annual swarming event usually occurs in February or March and coincides with a period of hot and humid weather. Winged ants appear at slightly different times around Ruffy, are associated with rain and their activity prompts farmers to dream of an autumn break.

Many people find it startling seeing an ant swarm flying around their home. Flying ants are often mistaken for termites and can cause alarm to those unaware of what is going on, the urge to spray them with fly spray is great but unnecessary.

Prior to swarming, ants are going about their everyday business and living in a colony in a nest. Many different species of garden ants nest in dry soil. You'll often find them in flower beds and lawns, and under paving slabs or stones. Patios are a favoured location. They are common in almost any dry, open area that is warmed by the sun including gardens, grasslands and bushland.

In the few weeks before the swarming event happens, you may see heaps of soil appearing above the nests.

An ant colony can only expand so much. At some point a new queen will need to strike out on her own to begin a new colony. She needs to meet and mate with

a male from a different colony and find a new area in which to start building her nest. Growing wings and flying enables her to do this.

Flying ants are known as alates, so each year alates emerge from nests and take flight. They aren't interested in people or picnics - they are just looking for a mate. The large-winged females and the smaller winged males are often seen flying joined together. This is known as the nuptial flight.

These flying insects may seem annoying to some people, but their tunnelling activities play a vital role in improving soil quality.

Their swarming events also provide a vital food resource for many species of birds like swifts and swallows.

The Future is Bright for the Tablelands Community Centre.

The Tablelands Community Centre was formed after the closure of the Ruffy School in 2005. At a public meeting widely attended by people from all over our Tableland: Caveat, Creightons Creek, Highlands, Longwood East, Pon Keen, Ruffy, Tarcombe, Terip Terip and Upton. It was hoped that the building and grounds not go on the open market for sale by the Education Dept. and could remain in the hands of the community to be used for educational, entertainment, internet, a meeting place, cultural, health and wellbeing purposes as well as a home for the Hughes Creek Catchment Collaborative (Landcare) office. This hope was realised with community support and the Strathbogie Shire becoming owners for community use in perpetuity.

It's fair to say that over the last 20 years the Community Centre has fulfilled these aims and more, providing a comfortable and central location for various individuals, visitors and groups to meet and hold events, run workshops or regular classes.

The Tablelands Community Centre is an unfunded not-for-profit incorporated association. Dedication and hard work by a volunteer committee and residents who are passionate about keeping it running has gone into making it a hub for the wider community.

FROG DISCOVERY WALK RAIL TRAIL – MERTON



Join the Upper Goulburn Landcare Network for a night of frog discovery. Learn to recognise different frog calls and help us collect important data on the rare Bibrons Toadlet.

There will be a short introduction from ecologist and frog expert David De Angelis followed by a guided walk along the rail trail listening, looking, and recording frogs.

April is the peak calling season for the threatened Bibrons Toadlet, so now is the time for us to get out and listen for them. The male toadlets call in autumn from depressions within damp leaf-litter. Eggs are then laid in the leaf litter and hatch after rain floods the area, providing water for the tadpoles.

Families are very welcome. Please wear clothing suitable for the weather (frogs love rain so don't be put off by a rainy evening). Bring a torch or headlamp.
